## Directions:

- 1. Think about something you enjoy, your favorite holiday, or your favorite animal.
- 2. The 1<sup>st</sup> line starts like a story... "There once was..." and has 8 9 syllables.
- 3. The 2<sup>nd</sup> line has 8 9 syllables and rhymes with the 1<sup>st</sup> line.
- 4. The 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> lines rhyme only with each other and have 5 6 syllables.
- 5. The 5<sup>th</sup> line rhymes with lines 1 and 2; it usually has 8-9 syllables.
- 6. Challenge: create a longer limerick with multiple stanzas, each stanza following this pattern but maintaining the topic choice.

"There was an Old Man in a Boat" by Edward Lear

There was an Old Man in a boat, Who said, 'I'm afloat, I'm afloat!' When they said, 'No! you ain't!' He was ready to faint, That unhappy Old Man in a boat.
